The book ends with a devastating piece about the capture and slaying by ISIS of four American journalists and aid workers, and our government's failed

response. On the fifteenth anniversary of 9/11, *The Terror Years* is at once a unifying recollection of the roots of contemporary Middle Eastern terrorism, a study of how it has grown and metastasized, and, in the scary and moving epilogue, a cautionary tale of where terrorism might take us yet.
